Undoubtedly a highlight for Summer will be the Youth Regatta hosted by SSCBC from 10–14 January. We expect some 300 off the beach boats. Already some 80 of our Members have signed up as volunteers. It will be great. You can read more about what is coming up in the various articles throughout this Spring/Summer edition of Tidings.

I would like to focus on our new staff and recent staff changes.

We have appointed Henry Dyer as our new Chief Executive Officer. Henry will be well known to many of our Members as he has been our Food & Beverage Manager, working with SSCBC on a contract basis for the past 12 months or so. In that role Henry has been instrumental in getting our F&B operations back on track. He has put together a great team who love coming to work each day, who love working for our Club. The success of our catering last summer, and continuing through the winter months, is a testament to Henry's managerial skills, his enthusiasm and passion in tackling his work.

But running SSCBC involves more than F&B. Although Henry is new to sailing, he is not new to managing and building businesses. Welcome back to what is shaping up to be a bumper 2019 – 2020 Sailing Season!

Over the

winter months our focus has been on the planning and preparation for the sailing season ahead of us.

The SSCBC Sailing Committee, consisting of Drew Marget, James Mighell, Andrew Skinner, Sally Law, Rhys Tucker, Harry Mighell, Tim Collett, David White and Ben Fels, has implemented a well-balanced sailing calendar to include aggregate and social racing that will entice all sailors.

Mercedes-Benz Mornington generously hosted our annual Couta Boat Season Briefing on 11 October at their showroom. A huge thank you to Chris Thoday and his team. We presented an overview of the season ahead including a brush up on rules and regulations, safety considerations and tactics. This will further be enhanced by our scheduled Couta Conversations throughout the season.

The Sailing Committee has once again reviewed our Club's sailing, race and risk management policies and procedures at the Club, with only some minor enhancements required following last year's indepth review. These are available online, under Couta Boats 'SSCBC Race Management Policies'.

This season's calendar has expanded with Couta Boat Social Racing. As part of our sailing strategy, this will

provide more opportunities to go for a fun and social sail with friends.

Howard Critchley has been tasked with helping to grow sailing and participation of the Couta Boat fleet at the Club. We have recognised that over time, some boats, crews or owners are not sailing as much as perhaps they might like to, for various reasons. Howard is our point of contact so if there is anything that the Club or the Couta Boat Association might be able to do to assist you onto the water more regularly, please be in contact.

Last season we had the most amazing day at the GANT Portsea Cup Picnic and Presentation at the Quarantine Station. The CBA and SSCBC would again like to invite families to come along and enjoy the fun and celebration of this historic weekend (Saturday 4th & Sunday 5th January 2020).

Our team has just returned from competing at the 2K Global Team Racing Regatta at the Royal Yacht Squadron in Cowes. After attending and competing in New York last year, we were honored to have been invited back to compete in this year's event. Our team has recently competed in Tasmania, travelled to Newcastle twice to sail in a regatta and then again to attend a team building weekend, and have been training regularly out of Royal Brighton Yacht Club.

The SSCBC 2K Team Racing Regatta squad has been filled by: Luke Aulich as Team Manager, George Aulich, Tom Trotman, Jack Abbott, Ben Gray, Michael Fels, Charlotte Llewelyn, Grace Cockman, and David White.

Our Junior and Youth sailors will be gearing up for a big season with training and coaching and we'll expand on the progression into the team and match racing program that has been so successful. We're thrilled with this format's revitalisation that sees teens and twenty somethings sailing together in fierce battles and having truckloads of fun.

The Ready Steady Tokyo Olympic Test Event and World Cup series was held at the Enoshima Yacht Harbour, Japan in August. In total, eight Australian boats took part in the regatta with SSCBC comprising two of them, making up a quarter of the Australian contingent. Harry Mighell was putting his foiling skills to the test, coaching Olympic Gold and Silver Medalist Nathan Outteridge and his sister Haylee in the mixed Nacra 17 Class. Harry was responsible for rig tuning which included choosing the mast and sail combinations, optimising foil and rudder trim angles and recommending the sailing mode. SSCBC Sailing Manager, Ben Fels, was also out on the water as the sole Australian International Judge which is a credit to him.

Will and Sam Phillips had a flying start at this event pushing through the breeze which was quite shifty at times. Unfortunately, Sam was then injured which didn't see the event finish as planned for the boys.

In the 49erFX, Tess Lloyd and Jaime Ryan had a very consistent regatta. The girls were 6th on day 1 and finished 6th on the final day of racing. The 49erFX scores, similar to the men's racing, had very up and down score cards. The

girls managed to have five top 5 results, four top 10 and four in the teens. But most importantly, when it counted in the medal race, the girls stepped up to the plate and finished in 4th place, which allowed them to leap frog Denmark into 6th place for the event (read Tess' report on page 38).

It was really pleasing to see our Members recognised at the Victorian Australian Sailing awards with Tom Trotman taking out Male Sailor of the Year, Peter Osbourne was Race Official of the Year and Ben Fels rounded it out with the Sports Professional of the Year.

Showing just how diverse our sailors are, Jack Lloyd, Tom Trotman, Ben Gray and Jack Abbott competed in the International Top Universities regatta in Quindau during August with the Monash team, achieving a remarkable 2nd place, beaten only by the local team and edging out sailing powerhouses including Oxford, Cambridge, UCLA, Berkley and Amsterdam.

The **AUSTRALIAN YOUTH**

CHAMPS will be held at SSCBC from 10-14 January with over 300 under 23 youth sailors competing at the Club. It's a pinnacle event for sailing and the winner will be selected for the 2020 Youth Worlds to be held in Salvador, Brazil.

It's a regatta on a massive scale and we will be running four race courses simultaneously. This will be a whole of Club effort - our volunteers will be seriously busy and having a great deal of fun as they go along. We're training people up for roles and expecting that many Members will continue on volunteering throughout

the year. We're thrilled with the level of support from the Couta Boat fleet, who are holding a Friday Twilight Aggregate as a feature for the Opening Ceremony.

TRAINING CENTRE REPORT





We have an exciting season planned for the Training Centre.

We plan to provide a pathway for every

Member above the age of 5 years to be active on the water at the Club. Whether you're a social Member who would like to try stand up paddle boarding, or a foiling sailor, we have something for you.

Over the summer months, we will run our popular Learn to Sail programs which are guided by our recommended age ranges. For all of these courses you do not need to have your own boat.

- Cara na Mara "Friends of the sea" (5-7 year olds)
- Sail & Play (8-11 year olds)
- OutThere Sailing (12-17 year olds)
- Adult lessons (18+)
- SheSails (female only course)

 Couta Coaching (all ages above 5 years old)

This year, with the Australian Youth Championships taking place over our busy January period, we have changed the format of our Learn to Sail Courses to go from 4 days of 2.5 hours (10 hour course) to a 3 day course of 2.5 hours (7.5 hour course). The cost of the course will be the same per hour as the previous year.

The newest course to join our program is Australian Sailing's OutThere Sailing. We're excited that this course has just been rolled out nationally, as we played a large part in its development. The aim of this course is to encourage more 12-17 year olds to become involved in our sport. What's different about this course is it has a primary aim to put fun first and keep friends together. The program will have a variety of aspects: sailing, stand up paddle boarding and powerboat experiences. If you have any questions about it, come and ask

me, as I'm very passionate about it and would love to talk to you.

In case you did not realise, the Club now has 10 stand up paddle boards. We hope that these boards will become a stepping stone to encouraging more Members to get out on the water. We intend to run social racing on the boards on those sunny January evenings. Watch this space.

This is a big year for Victoria and the Club as it is Victoria's turn to host the National Championships, which rotate from state to state. For our junior sailors, the big regatta

is the Optimist Nationals which are going to be held at the Royal Yacht Club of Victoria in January. This year the juniors are going to go up a gear when it comes to training. Our first big regatta is Sail Country and SSCBC will be one of the most represented Clubs. We are really excited for this event as it is a fantastic family experience.

Other national events taking place are the 420 Nationals at MYC and 29er/Nacras at BYS. The SSCBC lasers have their Nationals at SYC. As well as a National event in Victoria, there are also several world titles being held. Several of our Members will be on the organisation side of the Laser Worlds and we wish them the best of luck with the important job they have ahead of them.

At the opposite end of the bay we have the 49er/49erFX World Titles at Royal Geelong Yacht Club. We will have several Members taking part in this event and in the hunt to represent our Club and country to qualify to make it onto the biggest stage come next July. On the

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>>> ESCABECHE RECIPE – FROM BERNARD MCCARTHY

Serves 2

Ingredients

10 steamed local mussels - removed from the shell while warm

2 kipfler potatoes - cooked, peeled and sliced 1cm thick

1 chorizo sausage - diced into 2cm pieces and cooked in warm olive oil until crisp

1 carrot - peeled and thinly sliced 1 radish - thinly sliced

1/4 cucumber - peeled, cored and thinly sliced

Aioli - Escabeche dressing

3 tbsps white wine vinegar

3 tbsps white wine

2 tbsps extra virgin olive oil

Pinch saffron threads

Pinch salt flakes

Pinch sweet paprika

1/2 lemon juice

Warm liquid, add carrots, cook slowly for 2 minutes. Allow to cool and set aside.

Combine mussels, sliced potatoes, chorizo, cucumber and carrots with a little escabeche dressing to coat ingredients.

Gently layer on a plate, top with radish and flowers, dot aioli around, sprinkle a little black volcanic salt over.

Enjoy with an albarino white wine and crusty bread.

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

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>>> LA BELLE FRANCE CANALS - MILTON GREEN

What an unlikely name for a boat! Roberta maybe, but Robert? And even more unlikely, how did I, a salty wooden boat tragic for decades, get to be a part owner, with four blokes I had never met, in a 40 year old steel 10.4 metre boat located on the freshwater canals of France?

Cruising the 3,500 kilometres of inland France had always been on my Bucket List, but somehow I just never got around to it - something more attractive, usually sailing orientated, took precedence.

However, a 'light bulb moment' occurred at Sandringham Yacht Club after my regular 'Wednesday Wonders' race. On a cool evening in May last year, I was sharing post-race drinks with friends on the deck. Inside the bar was crowded and noisy as usual but outside we were under a speaker and were able to clearly hear the race results, start of the day, welcome to new members, yachts, grandchildren etc. Almost as an

afterthought, it was announced that a member had an interest in a French canal boat that he wished to sell.

On enquiring I was given the details of the vendor and contacted them the next day. Mike and Danielle had been in the syndicate for 15 enjoyable years but now felt it was time for something different. A retired Master Mariner based out of the UK, now back in Melbourne, his co-owners were an Accountant / Syndicate Secretary, an ex-Ansett / Thai pilot and two retired engineers. The boat is shared by the five owners like a time share property, with each having a month, May to September, in the Northern summer, negotiated over coffee early in the calendar year.

The syndicate has been running for over 30 years with various changes of owners over the decades. The boat is an Australian Registered Ship with a formal Constitution, well documented Mechanical Handbook and a full set of Canal

charts. A Victorian boating licence satisfies both French authorities and Pateneous Insurance Company.

A condition of a sale of a share is all owners have the opportunity to increase their holding and in the event no one is interested, all owners need to be comfortable with the new kid on the block.

I met and passed muster with three out of five. With kind words from Messrs Martyn, Mellet and Tucker, I had 100 percent due to their involvement with Brighton Rotary. Thank you, gentlemen!

With July 2019 my allocated month I had fingers crossed, as the previous year there was insufficient water in the canals for recreational and commercial activity. Conversely, there are evidently years when an excess of water means boats cannot pass under low bridges, so the boat remains in situ, plans are altered to usually treat the boat as a floating hotel, rent a car and go touring.



However, the weather Gods were on side and I, with friends from SYC and long-time fellow traveller, SSCBC member and preferred sailmaker Col Anderson, met in Epernay for change over and orientation.

After victualling the boat, including of course the local product, we headed west on the Marne River towards Paris.

Unlike our open cockpit Nepean and Cheviots, the traditional layout of most canal boats is a small upper deck over an aft cabin as many are used as liveaboards even in winter. A steering station, canopy and BBQ with 4 deck chairs and a small table substituted for the captain's chair, all fitted into this compact area. The weather for the entire month was perfect - the saloon dining area was only used for bag storage.

Layout below was traditional double Vee berth forward, galley, head including shower, unused lower steering wheel / instruments, saloon/ dining and twin bunk aft cabin with another head.

Speed limit is 5 knots with all hire boats, of which we shared locks with on many occasions, governed to that speed. The impressive commercial barges, usually loaded to the gunwales, travel at double that speed but incredibly are so designed below the waterline to leave no wash. We encountered many of these over the month, usually carrying quarry materials for the concrete batching plants or grain from the wheat farms via riverbank silos. Sharing locks with these behemoths was daunting at first but we were always treated courteously.

Interestingly, Robert flies a regular blue background Australian flag on her jackstaff rather than the traditional Red Ensign - Australians definitely better accepted than the English for whom we were mistaken in rural areas.

The Marne into Paris had limited marinas so we frequently spent evenings on the river bank. With a sledge hammer and steel pins it was an easy job to get someone ashore and 'voila' - instant 'bollards' for mooring lines.

The many interesting towns and villages all catered for river traffic with fresh produce available either from the traditional farmers markets or regular shops. We enjoyed breakfast and lunch on board daily, dinner ashore at many interesting bistros when possible and put the Australian built Sovereign BBQ to good use on many occasions.

Many of the lock keepers, a dying breed as many locks now are automated, supplement their income by selling fresh vegetables grown alongside their quaint centuries old stone cottages.

Two huge courgettes for two Euros stuffed and baked in the BBQ was one of just many memorable onboard dinners.

Disappointed at first that due to earlier overheating problems, we would not make Paris for Bastille Day, however we were delighted with the small town of Lagny, which had a floating pontoon with both power and water - much needed as our water tank is a minimal 300 litres. Moored in the centre of this quaint old town for two nights, we were in

prime position to enjoy a spectacular fireworks display rivalling that of Sydney's NYE, without the crowds of Paris.

With almost everything closed on the 14th we cruised into Paris locking up from the Seine into the Arsenal Marina I had previously booked. Multiple boats of all types and all nationalities were moored either side of what in reality is a closed off section of another canal. A few impressive Australian flagged boats opposite rafted up parallel to a public garden closed for security at night.

Close to the Bastille monument there was no shortage of restaurants in the Marais, an area of Paris I enjoyed for the first time.

Farewelling our Sandringham friends, we welcomed experienced canal travellers John and Judy Banks, also SSCBC members. Their daughter Karen and partner Alan had a hotel on an English canal and still spend half the year on their boat based in the UK with John and Judy joining them annually.

After the obligatory food and booze shop, we circumnavigated the Isle de Citie, getting close up views of the rebuilding works at Notre Dame before heading up stream towards the River Yonne junction for the next leg of our trip to the medieval city of Auxerre.

Prior to reaching that point we were advised of a permanent lock closure midway, so diverted to the canal de Loing, thence to canal Lateral Loire to Briare.

Not sure what we missed but our route was scenic, interesting and coincided with two days in the early forties. Fortunately, we had a mooring under century old plane trees - amazing how large they grow when not trimmed. Because this diversion was shorter than our intended route, after touching base at Briare, we continued south for a few days, terminating at Menetreol. Apart from an impressive Roman viaduct, this town was forgettable but an hour's walk took us to Sancerre, a fortress town perched atop a 330metre hill. Coincidentally, almost the height of Arthurs Seat. Cobblestone lanes, interesting shops, a wine Museum, pealing church bells and views of the surrounding vineyards, which we walked through on the downhill trip to the boat. A popular tourist destination we were pleased to find the butcher and an impressive cheese shop open - dinner sorted!

Backtracking to Briare, we again

Loire River 100 feet below us at 90
degrees. An unforgettable experience.

At Briare, the mundane but necessary laundry, refuelling and hose down before a final dinner ashore. Into Paris for a final night before flying out of CDG via Hong Kong, missing the riots by just a day. Can totally recommend this mode of travel as a very relaxing, interesting way of enjoying la belle France. The on-board bicycles were not used until the last day - something I will address next year!

2020 has already been booked and planned including a side trip to the four yearly Brest / Douarnenez Wooden Boat Festival, where hopefully the Club will again be represented. If you liked Hobart, you will love this. The intrepid McKeands now have a converted luxury barge in France -maybe we can organise a Sorrento Flotilla!



Change to Rules

The CBA General Committee, on the recommendation of the rules Sub-committee has changed Class rule 12.28 in an attempt to bring some uniformity to the purchase of new sails by limiting the number of sails purchased in a given period.

Class rule 12.28 is replaced with: New Sail Limitations

- (a) Each boat can only acquire one new No. 1 headsail each year and one new mainsail every second year.
- (b) The year commences on the 1st November each year.
- (c) Each sail must be issued with a measurement code. A sail is deemed to be acquired for the purpose of (a) when it is issued with the measurement code.
- (d) To be issued with a measurement code, a sail measurement sheet shall be completed by the sail maker and submitted to the technical committee.
- (e) Sail acquisition rights apply to the boat, not the owner.
- (f) Unused sail allocation cannot be carried forward to subsequent years.
- (g) The sail number, sail type, acquisition date and legible name of the measurer shall be entered on the boat's sail near the sail maker's logo.
- (h) Any re-cutting, re-design, alteration or repair shall not deem the sail to be a new sail for the purpose of (a) unless 33.3% or more of the material is replaced.

The SSCBC Sailing Committee, SSCBC Race Officers and Race Management team, the CBA General Committee and its Rules Committee, along with the SSCBC Handicap Sub-committee (no, we are not faceless - it is Ben Fels, Andrew Creek and Andrew Skinner) do their best to provide a fair playing field for all participants. All Couta boats are not equal, they never have been. All boat owners love their boats, we know that. Some love passage racing because it's more cruise, some love long tactical beats, some love the cut and thrust of short leg racing. We are all different.

Most of us love the idea of maintaining the integrity of our heritage fleet. Some want to make the boats easier to sail. Some give their bum a weekly antifoul wipe down. Some have locked on anti fouled rudders, some have lighter two packed rudders and take them off each week. Some use new sails and some use old ones. The Ripple is close to a hundred years old. Bella is 3 years old.

And on it goes, but I think you get the picture. So we operate the handicapping based on performance – just like amateur golf.

We use Topyacht. It's not perfect but it is good. It allows flexibility in setting parameters going up and going down. Past Club Captain/Commodore Robbie Hiam spent a lot of time getting it to suit the Couta boat racing needs and Ben Fels has made only minor amendments since then.

So, just as in the Sydney to Hobart Yacht Race there is interest in who (out of 3 or 4) gets there first, the other 85 boats are all sailing on handicap.

There is general agreement amongst all of the bodies listed above that the handicap results are all that matter. The Portsea Cup has an important additional trophy called the Merthon Trophy for 'First Home'. And there are a couple of honour boards that we wish to maintain that record Line Honours results in both Div 1 and Div 2. Make no mistake, we are sailing our Couta Boats for performance based handicap honours. So why all the fuss about new sails, smaller centreplates, different antifoul etc? It's because some of us just want to compete and beat the boats around us.

Abbott wants to beat Williams and Currie. Williams wants to beat Hart. Mighell wants to beat Critchley. Griffiths wants to beat Hurley. And Tucker wants to beat everyone. Whilst George just wants to go sailing.

Enough from me. Enjoy the season. Keep your noses clean and if you outperform your given handicap, you will have success on the podium.

With a growing contingent of Sorrento athletes travelling to compete across the globe in the penultimate year before the Olympics and the chilly winter mornings setting in, June was the perfect time to escape the cold and put our hard work to the test against some of the world's best sailors. Following on from Jack Lloyd's report in the previous issue of Tidings, Sorrento's group of 49ers set off to compete at Kieler Woche (Will and Sam Phillips - AUS 66; Ollie Manton and Jack Lloyd - AUS 204; James Grogan and myself - AUS 144), which is the biggest sailing regatta in the world and is located in far north Germany.

Usually described as extremely cold and stormy, the weather during our visit was quite the contrary, with

beautiful summer days and fair wind. With a few days to train and after getting used to driving on the wrong side of the road and without speed limits, we felt ready and excited to compete at our first open 49er regatta.

All the Australians slogged out the variety of conditions including both 9am and 9pm start times, days with harsh chop and days with fickle breeze. On the water, Will and Sam performed excellently, allowing them to compete in the Medal Race and finish the regatta in 7th. Meanwhile we were happy to have made gold fleet and to get a taste of what is to come.

The following day, James and I departed for Norway on a \$30 flight booked the day before, for we only

had 24 hours until the start of our next 49er regatta, the Junior Worlds. In a series of fortunate events, we managed to stumble across the PRO of the event at the airport upon landing and were very graciously offered some much-needed transport to the event.

With only a brief sail before the regatta started, we managed to lead all the races on the first day around the top mark before making a fall from grace in each one, symbolic of a regatta which highlighted key areas for improvement. Off the water, we were faced with an almost never setting sun and ridiculously high food prices. Fortunately, between the innovation of blinds and the organisers providing us with dinner most nights, we came out of the regatta with many learnings and



invaluable racing experience, as well as improving on our result from last year.

The following day we found ourselves stranded in a small fishing town in Norway, with our mast and sails still by our sides, both of which should have been on their way home. Fortunately, between some hurried favours, borrowed vehicles and some much-needed sleep, both were on an adventurous journey home with only a little extra stress added.

Trying to make the most of my time away, I had decided it wise to explore Norway and Japan before returning home the following week. However, it would appear sailing is unavoidable and less than a week after leaving Norway I found myself in Enoshima, at the home of the 2020 Olympic venue having extended my trip a further 2 weeks to assist Will and Sam in their preparation. This experience I am still yet to fully fathom as less than two years ago I hadn't even stepped on a 49er.



Here is a day by day update from David White and the team who competed in the 2K Global Team Race Regatta held at the Royal Yacht Squadron in Cowes, UK. After our successful campaign at the inaugural event at the New York Yacht Club last year, SSCBC was pleased to be representing Australia again. This regatta took place from 25-29 September 2019.

Day 1

The team assembled in Dublin, Ireland for training at the National Yacht Club in Dun Laoghaire. We were training in Elliot 6s with a focus on boat handling. This was mainly straight line boat speed which then built up to boat on boat tight manoeuvres. Getting clean off the start line will be a big priority. We aim to put this into our first practice regatta which is taking place tomorrow. Tomorrow is a big day with a 2K Regatta taking place at the Yacht Club. There are 5 teams taking part, two from the National Yacht Club, Royal Cork Yacht Club (who are travelling to Cowes) and a team made up of my friends from University who

I sailed with years ago, who have years of team racing experience under their belt.

Day 2

The day started off with all teams meeting at the National Yacht Club to watch Ireland take on Scotland at the rugby World Cup. The day went as planned with Ireland beating the Scots. On the racina side of things, we started off with a light breeze which picked up nicely to about 10 knots. The course for this regatta was pretty simple in

that it was just a start line and two top marks only 100 meters up rounding them to starboard on a two lap course with a downwind finish.

The team pulled up pretty well beating our main rivals, Royal Cork Yacht Club twice and finishing first overall in the warm up regatta. Along with the confidence boost, it was great to have tight racing in the lead up to Cowes.

Day 3

Dublin unfortunately caved and it started raining. Building on the lessons from the Regatta the day before, the team shifted gears for some heavy wind training with gusts up to 28 knots hitting the water. Our team decided it would be beneficial to swap skippers for three practice races and find out the pros for the two different styles that they have.

When the big breeze hit, we did a couple of big up winds to work on our straight line speed.


After a physical training session, the team are going to explore Dublin City and fly out for Cowes tomorrow.

A bit of a mixed day. We had extremely windy conditions - "blow jibs off mast weather". Racing was initially due to start after our briefing at 8am but was postponed due to the high winds. We set out on the water at 10am with reefed sails.

Race 1 was against the Irish team Royal Cork Yacht Club (Fun Fact: they will be celebrating their 300 year anniversary as the oldest club in the world next year). We ended up getting a solid start and got a 1st and 2nd through the finish line.

Race 2 was against St Francis from San Francisco. Tom had an incredible race, but in the end, we lost it on the finish line. This was a bitter loss to swallow as they finished 3rd at last year's event and it was there for the taking but a miscommunication got in the way.

Race 3 was against the Dutch. After a commanding start, leaving one boat 50 meters behind in our dust we had boat gear failure with the head of our jib blowing out. We received redress for this race meaning we will have a resail.

Race 4 - Royal Thames Yacht Club (last year's winners). After a pre start battle in 25+ knots, sadly our jib on a different boat blew out. This resulted in another resail. This was the indicator that it was too windy to rave on and we were sent in. Our sail in was an hour beat into the breeze that was 30+ knots.

Day 5

Another big day on the water. Today the weather started up in breeze ranging from 16 to 23 knots which isn't ideal team racing conditions and kept on building from there.

First race of the day was against the Dutch. Unfortunately, an eager start led to a boat being over and gave the Dutch a 2 on 1 which is not what you do against this experienced side. In the end the Dutch where victorious. This wasn't ideal as we were in the same situation before are jib blew out the day before.

The next two races were against the experienced Newport Harbour California and New York Yacht Club. Both tier 1 teams. Both races started off very promising and we were leading on the upwind leg which a big leap for us compared to the previous year. Unfortunately, boat handling in 20+ knots got in the way and we were out of sync of what manoeuvres we

can do in that breeze. Very valuable lessons learnt in that race.

The next two races were India and Germany. Thankfully we got rewarded for these races. The German race was particularly tight and decided on the finish line. Racing was then abandoned when winds picked up to 30+ knots

Day 6 - Final day of sailing.

With a similar forecast/weather, we were sailing in the upper limits of these boats with gusts getting right up to 30 knots.

We ended up just doing four races today and finishing off one round robin. The first race was Japan. Sadly, this race was similar to the Irish rugby game in that the Japanese seized the right opportunity. After we led a 1 2 around the whole course, but on the final mark the Japanese snuck on the inside and pinned out one of our boats. The frustrating thing about high winds is we can't play the tactical battle as much and boat handling comes through.

Next race, we had the Royal Yacht Squadron. This was the most frustrating race of the competition as we had again a 1, 2 for the entire course and on the last 30 meters, an umpire made a call that later was admitted as a mistake. Which again cost us the race. But that's sport - not always perfect.

We faced Argentina next where we won 1,2. The final race was Royal Thames who won that race convincingly in the high breeze.

Racing was then called with the round robin complete and wind getting up to 35 knots which is not team racing weather.

In the end, we finished up 9th overall which is a bit frustrating. Out of the 11 races we did, only two were in wind under 20 knots. In those races we beat Cork, who finished 5th, and Saint Francis, who just beat us on the





finish line. So, we know we had more potential in our team racing skills and we have learnt how to sail keel boats in very heavy conditions.

In the end, we were lucky to get out given the forecast for the 3 days and the organisers certainly put their boats in harm's way as we had travelled the distance.

The team would like to thank SSCBC for their support and Team Manager Luke Aulich for his valuable contribution. My favourite bit about this experience was how all you could get this group to talk about was the racing we had just completed, whether it was over dinner or breakfast.



The season consisted of competing at the World Cup Series Genoa, French Olympic Week Hyeres and what





was my favourite event, the Laser Senior Europeans held in Portugal.

halves! The **Sanpellegrino** Cup will be held in mid February – always a great day and a chance to sample some of their new flavours.



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














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
