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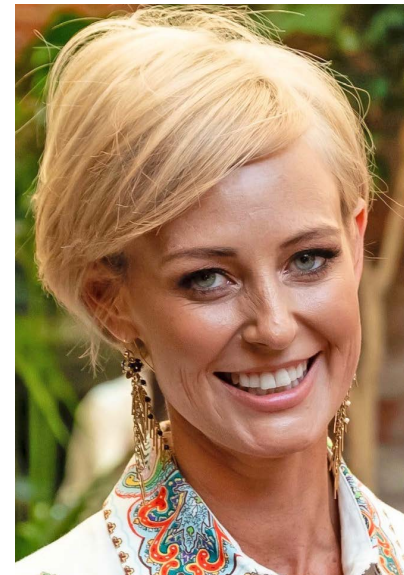
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COMMODORE'S REPORT



Welcome to the 2023/24 edition of SSCBC's Tidings Magazine. I am writing this in my third, and final term as Commodore of SSCBC, and it provides me the opportunity to reflect not only on the year just gone, but across my tenure. It is fair to say it has been an interesting ride... from COVID, to the closure of the Clubhouse for the redevelopment until finally a fully functioning Club on and

off the water during the summer just gone. Most importantly though, it has been a privilege to serve this wonderful Club as your Commodore.

We kicked off the season in November with an Opening Day in our new Clubhouse, the first in four years! It felt fantastic to welcome Members and guests back to showcase our amazing new facilities, and to hear from one of our own, Will Baillieu, talking about his experiences growing up sailing on the Peninsula, and then taking it to the world as a member of the America's Cup team for Australia 2.

There was a strong sense of anticipation for the summer ahead. With our facilities fully complete and an amazing calendar of sailing, community and social events scheduled for the summer, excitement was high, and, on reflection, the season certainly delivered.

We kicked things off in early December with the WASZP Games.

Sailors from 11 countries, as well as nine SSCBC sailors competed, with our youth sailors Henri and Miles Levenspiel also participating in some coaching. Whilst the weather was not always kind and the winds were tricky there was a huge sense of pride in once again being able to host world class events at SSCBC. Later in the season we hosted a successful Youth Championships, and it was fantastic to see so many volunteers from our Club get involved on and off the water, providing an incredible experience for all of the sailors involved.

In early January we welcomed KPMG back to the Club for the annual KPMG Couta Boat Classic. KPMG Day remains an iconic event on the calendar, and over 420 people attended the day, sailing on 41 Couta Boats before enjoying incredible hospitality in the Clubhouse. This day is not possible without our Couta Boat owners and sailors being willing to host guests of KPMG on their boats, and I would like to thank the 125 sailors who put their hands up this season, including several Couta Boats from neighbouring clubs.

As always, we ran a full suite of our iconic sailing and social events across the season. carsales Portsea Cup was a long but successful day with the winds not coming in until late in the afternoon, our Acacia Energy Next Gen Day was the largest we have hosted, and Lady Skippers Day supported by Raw Materials, Zhik and Pommery saw over 200 ladies get onboard Couta Boats, many for the first time. Our Pommery Summer Drinks was held in the Clubhouse for the first time and our annual Ladies Lunch raised over \$19,000 for our charity

partner, Mornington Peninsula Foundation.

Supporting all of these events is a large group of loyal and involved organisations, sponsoring various races throughout the Couta Boat and Off The Beach (OTB) season, as well as our Member engagement and social events such as Pommery Summer Drinks. Please see Hollie's Sponsorship Report which includes a handy table listing every one of our partners and their contact details, including name, email and mobile number, should you need to reach out to them.

For yet another year, our OTB sailors equipped themselves incredibly well, both locally, nationally and overseas. One of the wonderful aspects to the OTB Junior Sailing Program is the engagement

of entire SSCBC families, and it was a delight this year to see kids in their dinghies with parents volunteering on the start boat, or out on RHIBs taking photos. As we look to review and enhance our OTB program before next season, our focus will be to build on this momentum, encouraging parents and grandparents to get actively involved in supporting the OTB program.

Before the end of the 2022/23 season, we started the process of developing a new all of Club strategy. Following a period of major change with COVID and the redevelopment, it was important that as a Club we were clear on our culture and our purpose, and that we understood the needs of our Members. Through a series of focus

groups from across the membership base, we identified three core themes;

1. Our core purpose is and always should be sailing
2. Our Club is a place for Members to connect and engage with their friends, family and communities
3. Our Members want to contribute, and that volunteers are the heartbeat of our Club

Announced at the end of June, our Club strategy *Sailing for All, Sailing for Life* ensures that we are focusing on growing and supporting our Couta Boat and OTB fleets whilst continuing to provide outstanding experiences for all of our Members, on and off the water.

Over the coming weeks and months, you will see a number of initiatives – large and small – that will support our strategy and vision. Some of this has already been kicked off including giving new Members an induction that encourages them to get involved in sailing and volunteering, greater emphasis on sailing stories in our marketing and communications and stronger governance with the formation of our Finance Sub-Committee and Nominations Committee.

Over the winter months, we have also been holding Member engagement events such as the Trivia Night, the Abba Night and Member driven functions such as our 1892 All Comers and Men's Lunches. There is much more to come.

The past three seasons have demonstrated to me the importance of having a strong team around you, and I have been incredibly lucky to work with a highly capable General Committee. I would like to extend my thanks to all of the General Committee and Sub-Committee members I have had the privilege of



working with over the past few years, as well as the management team led by our GM Gavin Wall.

As I look ahead to the next season there is much to be excited about. Our *Sailing for All, Sailing for Life* strategy will continue to be imbedded in the Club, ensuring that our world class facilities provide opportunities for all of our Members to connect socially but most importantly, on the water or in a volunteering capacity with their family and friends.

When I joined the Club nearly 10 years ago, our family had two little kids very keen to learn to sail, and two enthusiastic but non-sailing parents. Getting our children on the water and into the sailing program will mean a life-long love of the sport for them, but for our whole family it has fostered friendships,

given us a community on the peninsula and led to me taking an active role in the Club. I have also enjoyed sailing from time to time in recent seasons (I'm still learning!) but I look forward to continuing to appreciate our heritage Couta Boats and the surroundings we are so fortunate to call our Club. I know that when I hand over the reins to new flag officers in October, the Club will be in very good hands, and I am honoured to have been part of the journey.

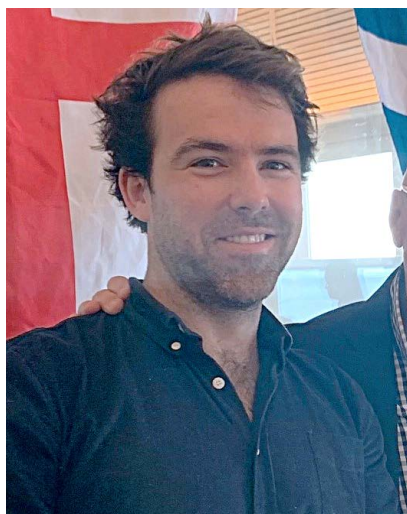

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CLUB CAPTAIN'S REPORT



Firstly, I'd like to thank all who have made this season possible; my first as Club Captain. From our wonderful staff, volunteers in the tower, race officers, bosuns, committees and parents, it's been huge year and I'm incredibly grateful for the support we have received along the way.

Pleasingly, our Couta Boat fleet has seen a remarkable resurgence this year, with robust growth across every racing event on our calendar.

Highlights include;

- 2024 carsales Portsea Cup
- 45 boats (+25% on last year)
- 2023/2024 TLC Healthcare CBA Nationals
- 39 boats (+25%)
- SheSails Lady Skippers Race
- 39 boats (+20%)
- Sorrento Cup
- 35 boats (+65%)
- Acacia Energy Next Gen
- 27 boats (+10%)

Following a series of difficult seasons, marked by COVID-19 and the redevelopment of the clubhouse, this year was an important step towards rebuilding our sailing programs. The increase in numbers on the water and the Club's renewed focus on sailing participation and volunteerism through the recent strategy launch are all pointing towards an exciting season 2024-25.

Our Junior OTB fleet has had a very successful year, with our Optimist sailors celebrating podium finishes at State, National and International level as covered brilliantly in Jack Lewis's Regatta Report in this issue. The Sailing Centre is lucky to be led by David White and his team who are some of the most highly regarded OTB coaches in the world – we are very fortunate to have them. I look forward to seeing what's ahead for some of these talented juniors.

We've placed particular emphasis this year on our growing youth fleet. We've seen more junior sailors transition to youth classes this year which has been incredibly encouraging. With our strong recent history in the skiff classes, we are also very proud to see Henri & Miles Levenspiel and Jorja & Mason Mahoney flying the flag for SSCBC in the 29er class. The season was highlighted by Henri & Miles 2nd place at the 29er Vic State titles and a strong result from both teams at the East Coast Championship held on St Georges River.

Those who were around the Club in November and December were lucky enough to witness the WASZP Games come to Sorrento. This event was a wonderful showcase our Club on the international stage, as well as the strength of our WASZP program, with 9 Members taking to the water to compete. A huge congratulations to all involved, including race management, staff, volunteers, competitors and families!

Our Jubilee fleet has also rallied this year, with participation across many of our Club racing events whilst



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the Club was particularly proud to host the J. A. Linacre Memorial Trophy in February. Congratulations to Michael Cantwell and crew for taking out the win!

Our 2K team racing team won their second Australian National 2K team racing title in Tasmania. Congratulations to Jack Abbott, Tom Trotman, Sunday Gibson, Tom Klemens, Jack Lloyd, Grace Cockman, Michael Fels and Steph Gray.

This year we kicked off a new initiative with the weekly Club Captain's Column in eTidings. I hope you've enjoyed hearing from different areas of our sailing community each week and we hope to continue this program next season. A particular thanks to Emma Phillips who has been editing/organising the column, as well as all who have submitted pieces this season.

Recently, we said farewell to Ben Fels, who finished up a long tenure

The two Couta Boats made the passage North a few days prior in a perfect following breeze under sail. They were equally fortunate to have a gentle Easterly on Monday for the return. The Regatta opening was a well attended and enjoyable cocktail function in the F J Darley boatshed complete with classic yachts under restoration.

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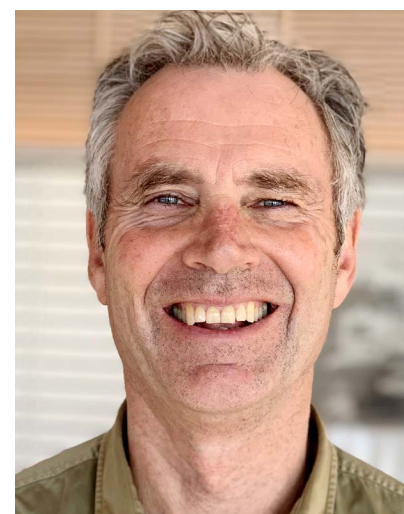

GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT



At the end of my first year at the Club, it gives me great pleasure to reflect on the successful achievements and developments that we as a Club have made in the last 12 months.

Our first full season in the new clubhouse has proven to be a success, with positive feedback from our Members. Despite delays in the installation of memorabilia, including honour boards, burgees, racing trophies, and half models, some of these items are now proudly displayed in the Members' lounge, reminding us of the Club's rich history and sense of community.

Feedback from Member forums conducted in 2023 has played a crucial role in guiding our actions throughout the year. Key areas of focus included enhancing Members' access to and enjoyment of the Club, improving security measures on the western lawn and the deck, and maximising capacity in a way that allows Members to fully utilise the facilities without overcrowding. The addition of fencing around the western lawn has created a welcoming space for Members to

The Sailing Centre is the first introduction for young sailors to get involved on the water at Sorrento. We work with

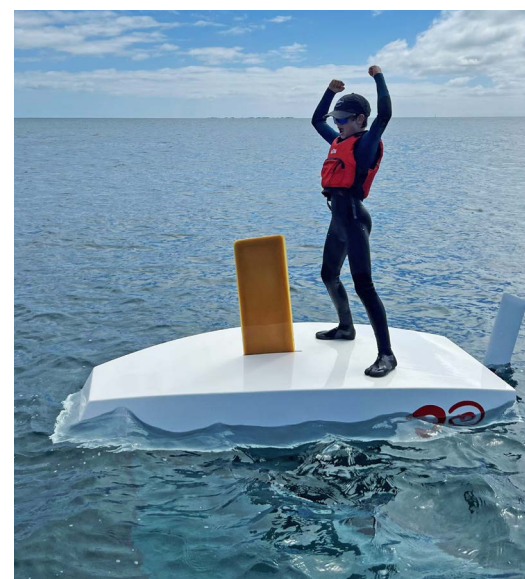

This year it was fantastic to see so many people making great memories on the water in a variety of ways.

Our Sailing Centre season kick started in the September holidays. This year we had cracker weather and had great sessions on the water. We had lots of our sailors graduate from our Learn to Sail program to our Team Sorrento coaching group and it was great to

see new families buy boats and join our clan.

To help store our boats, our hardstand received a few upgrades over last winter and you may have noticed the new Optimist racks built by Adam Richards, Bret and Henri Levenspiel which makes a big difference to maximising space. - Through VIODA, the Club ran a team racing clinic for the Optimist Class in November which led to another Optimist National Championship awarded to SSCBC Members;
- Several Team Sorrento sailors raced in the Victorian Schools Team racing titles which had close to 200 students competing; and
- Our Next Gen group of sailors travelled to Tasmania to retain their 2K Teams Racing National title.

Team Racing is certainly a fun and competitive form of sailing that our youth sailors in particular enjoy. Crews work together to achieve a common goal and have a lot of fun along the way. Watch this space as we continue to explore other ways to increase our Team Racing at Sorrento, one of which is the Mr Trampoline Buxton VIS Cup coming up next season. This will be an ideal opportunity for our Junior and Youth sailors to learn alongside VIS Athletes in a fun, team racing format. Our

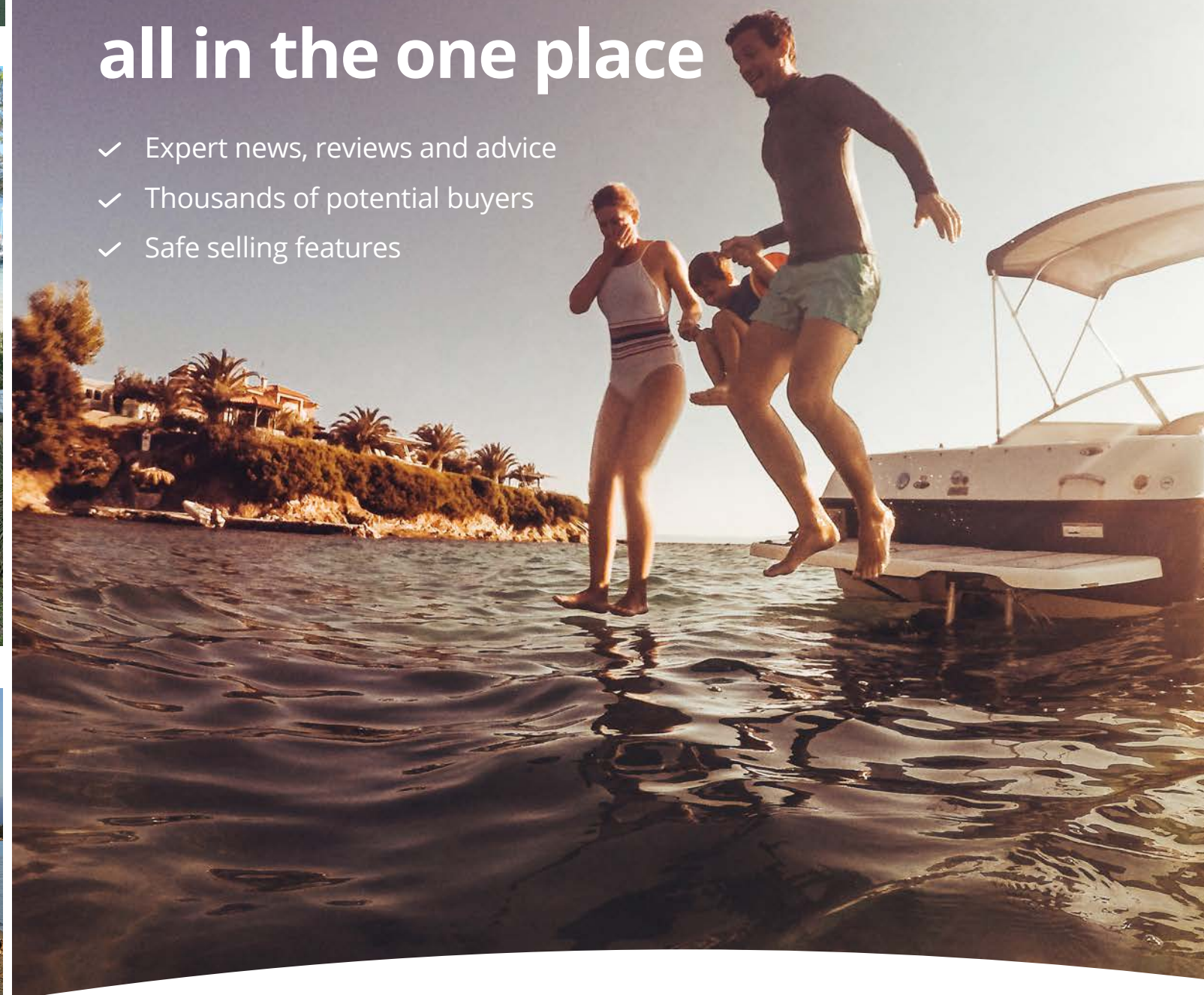

by accident. A big thank you to Phil Banbridge and Lachie McKenzie who put so much time and energy into this. 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CLUB CAPTAIN'S COLUMN



Due to popular demand, here is the Club Captain's Column that appeared in eTidings on 16 January 2024 by Peter Bennetts about Couta Boat Rip C06: a much-loved stalwart of the Couta Boat fleet – 'we never won anything' Rip. Rip's recent success – most notably winner of the 2023 Couta Boat Nationals in Division 1 – is a testament to the notion that our boats have many lives and untold possibilities that span decades. Thank you to writer and crew Peter Bennetts for this fantastic account of Rip's recent escapades.

How good are Couta Boats!

Of all the fleet there's one boat that stands out, she's the Rip. Conspicuous for the fun her crew always have, and for being blue, very blue (ultramarine blue in fact). Aboard the Rip there's constant banter, jokes, teasing, foul language, and ill-formed dissertations on any subject. And apart from Rodney 'Zappy' Eggleston's enthusiastic starboard calls there's never a raised voice. While there are egos aplenty on the Rip, they're put aside; you're first and foremost her crew,



it's all about getting her going – and she loves to go! That said, she doesn't much like light air but when it blows her bow goes down and she charges, rolling through tacks and gybing with nary a loss of momentum. We tap her sides and egg her on 'carn the Rip', 'go the Rip'.

The Rip was built properly – with traditional means and the right materials – by Chris 'Sinny' Sinn at The Wooden Boatshop in 1986. Chris built a boat and ended up with a family; cracking onto his mate's widowed sister, aided by building her kids a swing next to the boat shed.

Sinny will tell you 'We never won anything!' and for almost 40 years that was the case. Zappy, the kid who'd enjoyed swinging next to the Rip while she was being built – and whose mum Jane Sinny would later marry – would echo "We always come last". It was a pity party.

But that all changed last year. Col Anderson made us some new Doyle sails and with Will Phillips at the helm, joined by Georgina Oakley, Geoff Bainbridge, Scott Smith, Zappy, Sinny and this writer as crew, the Rip was off! Along with many of her storied Couta friends, the Rip was trucked to Sydney, enjoyed her first sail on the Harbour, her first taste of the Pacific Ocean, AND won the NSW State Championships along with the Gaffers & Muriel Trophies. The Rip was finally getting the story she deserved.

During the awards ceremony at the Sydney Amateurs Sailing Club, Australia's oldest sailing club, and on the occasion of its 150th Anniversary, Sinny held the trophies high and quoted Dennis Conner; "We slaughtered 'em". Sinny was also pretty happy to have won a tin of anti-foul. Alas some gear failure and a few errors meant we only managed a mid-fleet finish in the



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'22 National Championships sailed up at Pittwater. Still, we and the Rip had all the fun that could be had.

Fast forward to last week: Sorrento and the '23 National Championships – and the Rip takes all. In 4 races sailed over 2 days - in middling, fluky southeasterlies – the Rip triumphed with a 1, 3, 5, 2 in Division 1 while Nick Williams' Wagtail heroically took line honours in every race. Interestingly Wagtail



and the Rip are both Ken Lacco designs – and were built alongside each other (and that swing) at The Wooden Boatshop.

We were a crew of five; short Geoff and Sinny. Sinny took out his beautiful 46-foot Couta Fishing Smack Jane to spectate and most importantly throw over to the Rip our lunch of ham rolls. Sinny's ham rolls are the best, possibly because he (not so) meticulously matches the ham pound for pound with butter, and are surely a large part of the Rip's recent success.

Five on board worked well for us in the generally lighter conditions; there's space to get around the cockpit that much quicker yet enough hands for the work to be done. How good at starts is Will!?



That is when he doesn't put us over! Being the only blue boat here is a distinct disadvantage; it's impossible to hide in a mostly vanilla fleet. And how patient is Will? There's not a nicer person on this planet, he's just the best – we all harbour a crush.

Scott Smith is always a stalwart at the mast and makes easy work of getting the centreplate up – the Rip's is 200kg! Zappy's attention span is perfect for the foredeck; intense activity, followed by inaction. He's also quick and enthusiastic with those aforementioned starboard calls as well as making for perfectly targeted ballast – who needs a swinging keel when you've got a swinging Zappy that can move to just where he's needed? After the Portsea Cup that proved to be over

the side in the drink. Georgina's bloody good on the headsail trim and for all the other pushing and pulling a Couta Boat needs. We're looking forward to 'Georgina & Tonic' again taking the helm in this February's 2024 Lady Skippers Cup.

We had fun, sailed well, the Rip charged in her home waters, and Sinny got to roll out 'We slaughtered 'em' once more. The waters off Sorrento are superb and clear, the winds are always a challenge one way or another, and the SSCBC a welcoming world-class venue. We're already looking forward to defending the title next year.

>>> AN AUSSIE ADVENTURE

It's been a few years since I penned a trip report to the sscbc members. We have had trips since then but none to equal our sailing holidays in Sardinia and Greece

Until now. Technically this was not a sailing adventure but it is still worth sharing.

Some two years ago a friend called and told Chrissy and me that she had booked the Kimberley Quest for 8 nights in June 2024 from Broome up to the Mitchell River and would we like to join them.



The Kimberley Quest is about 75' long with nine guest berths and nine crew. A Captain, 2 deckhands, a chef, 3 house staff, a naturalist (walking encyclopaedia) and a helicopter pilot with his chopper on the roof.

We joined the guest list along with a group of friends including other sscbc Members James & Ali Mighell, David & Sarah Hendy and Fred & Cas Haig. The booking was a Private Charter which brings several benefits including a discount on the cost. Flying to Broome is so easy with several direct flights from Melbourne from late May to end July. There are plenty of accommodation options in Broome where the weather is boring at this time of the year.... 31°C and sunny every day!

The Kimberley Quest ground staff picked us all up from our Hotels and delivered us to the boat for a 5pm departure on day 1 where we settled in and met the crew with a safety briefing - drink in hand.

(We had been allowed to provision the liquor supplies ourselves which was great but it was a bit of a challenge to predict how much 18 people might drink in 8 days!) We managed!



The first night was quite a long motor through the night from Broome past Cape Leveque to Silica Beach where we had the chance to hop off the boat for a swim at this stunning beach which comprises silica, not sand as we know it. I am not sure why the crocs and the sharks don't go there, but apparently they don't!



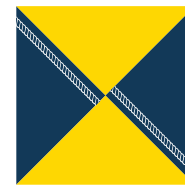

The Kimberley Quest tows 3 x tinnies each with 90hp outboards and a larger 20 seat jet boat making shore expeditions and fishing trips easy. Each day was filled with activity and rather than

give you a blow by blow description, here are some highlights

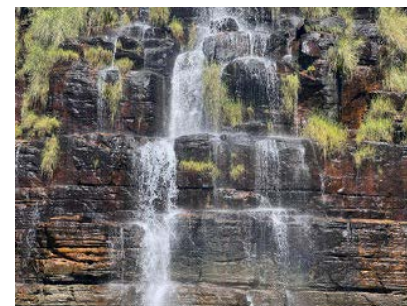


- The famous Horizontal Falls, once described by David Attenborough as one of his 7 wonders of the world. And the nearby Cyclone Creek.
- Montgomery Reef, in my mind more spectacular even than the Horizontal Falls. Turtles, sharks and birds abound as the 9 metre tidal flow gives way to expose a reef where moments earlier all you could see was... sea!
- There is a sand cay near the Reef that also exposes itself at low tide and after visiting the reef we returned to the vessel to find the crew had set up our pre-dinner cocktails on this football oval sized "beach"
- Careening Bay where in 1820 Captain Phillip Parker King beached the Mermaid for re-planking before he continued his circumnavigation charting the Australian coast. There is a 200+ year old Boab tree there where one of his crew carved an inscription to commemorate their visit. The tree is in good order now has a girth of 12 metres.



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- Sheep Island, where in 1864 200 settlers from Victoria attempted to farm sheep. They were sold the dream of being gifted acreage if they moved there. Nobody seemed to have checked on whether this was an appropriate place to settle and the project was ill fated and doomed to fail.



- Kings Cascades, in the Prince Regent River, a spectacular waterfall where in 1987, following the America's Cup regatta, a group travelled to the Kimberley and a young American woman Ginger Meadows, aged 24, made an error of judgment and tried to swim from a ledge by the waterfall back to their boat and was taken by a resident crocodile. The attack was witnessed by her helpless and horrified friends and boat's captain.
- The Buccaneer Archipelago, a series of hundreds of small islands with an abundance of bird and fish life.



- Aboriginal rock art sightings at approved locations, viewing art from thousands of years ago.

Along the way there were opportunities to fish for Barramundi, for Mangrove Jack a good eating snapper, for Queen Fish, Coral Trout and even Giant Trevally.

all to have a bbq lunch in a totally inaccessible rocky gorge.

REGATTA REPORTS

>>> 2023 WASZP WORLD GAMES

It's kind of ironic that a Club that is synonymous with the venerable Couta Boat fleet is now also one of the most highly sought after championship venues for the increasing number of foiling classes. Leading off with the Moth World Championships in 2015, the flat waters which accompany our predominantly southerly breezes provide the ideal conditions for these boats – consequently they have been regular visitors to Sorrento in the years since.

The 2023 WASZP World Games in December attracted 90 competitors from 11 countries (Canada,

Denmark, France, Great Britain, Italy, New Zealand, Norway, Spain, Switzerland and US), contesting ten races over five days. The main event was preceded by a three day Nationals, and a Sail Melbourne satellite regatta the week before.

Sam Street (NZL) dominated the Men's fleet, successfully defending his title from Lake Garda in 2022. Magnus Overbeck (DEN) claimed 2nd (and 1st Youth) with Hippolyte Gruet (FRA) rounding out the podium.

In the Women's division Hattie Rogers (GBR) took gold (14th overall), with Helena Sanderson 2nd and Tess Lloyd 3rd.

The Waszp is undeniably an exciting class, both to sail and watch. Designed by Andrew MacDougall (Amac), it is intended to be a more accessible one-design foiling boat than the Moth. They have a very strong class culture, and held

daily 'Tech Talks' during the regatta to bring on the younger sailors. The morning yoga sessions were also something we hadn't seen at the Club before! It should be noted that Amac sailing in the Super Masters division (50+) finished 35th overall and posted a 10th in the final race – clearly he's still got it.

The class does present challenges for race management – lightning fast, spin in their own length, and the start line pin is over the horizon. One of our team who is on the trajectory to become a race officer said that they didn't think they wanted to continue with that ambition as it was so overwhelming. I assured them that this was about as hard as it gets – "When you get back to Couta Boats it will be like it's happening in slow motion!"

Obviously events like this don't happen without a huge effort from our Club Members, and the

number of people who stepped up and carried the load was amazing. From the on-water team through to tower staff, registration, jury, beach management and homestay hosts it was an incredible effort – this is what separates a good regatta from a great one, and this one was definitely great.

One team deserves special mention, and they are the recipients of the 'Attaboy Award' – Jack and Jeremy Lewis in the pin boat. Picture yourself in a 6 metre RHIB at the other end of the start line. Eighty Waszps coming straight at you at a speed that must feel like Mach 1. Seconds before impact the starting signal sounds and the whole fleet flicks up the course just as Tom and his posse come from your blind side and cross them all on port. Now your pulse rate can drop back into double figures while you reflect that you'll have to do it again in twenty minutes. If you don't have nerves of steel, don't apply for this job. Little wonder the class refer to that role as the Sitting Duck!

One of the main reasons we host major events at Sorrento is so that our junior and youth sailors can experience top level sailing and be inspired by champions. There's not

too many other sports where you can find yourself lining up on the start line next to an Olympian. And off the water is just as much fun – walking through the boat-park of a major regatta like this one is an experience all by itself, and there was a palpable buzz around the Club for the entire event. There was a lot of very complimentary feedback

from the competitors, and we'll be seeing many of them back here in the future.

Postscript. Just to add a bit of context; the 2017 Waszp World Champion was Harry Mighell, and 2018 European Champion was Tom Trotman.

>>> IQ FOILING WINDSURFER YOUTH CHAMPS

Enjoy this recap from Mark Lloyd who volunteered on Annie Laurie for the Youth Champs – a real first-hand experience of what it's like being a Race Officer amongst the action!

From a Race Officer's perspective, running windward/leeward course racing with a target time of 12 minutes and a slalom course with a target time of 4 minutes in a fluke 2-6 knot breeze, is a daunting task to say the least.

Tonia, Maree Deeth, and myself aboard Annie Laurie and our IQ fleet of nine starters ready for action.

Race one; AP down. We now have over five knots.

Class flag up and into a five minute sequence.

At three minutes the whole fleet has decided to cross the start line and are now racing. Confusion!!

Ok, let the sequence run and then abandon the race seems to be the fairest option. Just a little more work

for the timer and flag person. A quick discussion with the class coach on water and a radio call to the PRO, a change of sailing instructions and away we go with a three minute start sequence. Everyone is happy and the show goes on.

The beauty of being flexible and having an understanding that for youth sailing it's as much about being on the water with your mates as it is about the competition. The IQ fleet need around five knots for the lighter sailors to get up on foil with the heavier competitors needing to really work their sail to promote plaining. The fleet was made up of mostly NSW & VIC sailors with male and female competing together, all under the age of 23. These boards are seriously quick once the breeze is up and are a joy to watch from the safety of an anchored start boat.

As the regatta progressed the unstable wind continued to be just that and any increase in strength meant getting the AP flag down and into the next race as soon as



practicable. The maximum number of races were run.

It was so great to be a Race Officer with a water crew on our course who understood the needs of the IQ sailors. David White and Peter McCann were able to shift the marks when required without having to hold up a start sequence. We also had a designated rescue craft on course crewed by Australian Sailing employees, Meagan Densley & Ruth Morton. Due to the extremely light conditions, they had a tough job on the rhib; the most strenuous task being radio replies.

When back on shore, SSCBC was humming with the voices of young sailors recounting their day on the water with family and friends, sails being rolled and bagged, boards being dried, foils being very carefully washed and put back in their protective covers. This regatta was a great test for aspiring athletes to progress onto the next level, if that is the direction they wish to take or just have fun sailing with mates, making friends for life.

>>> 2K TEAMS NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

Royal Yacht Club of Tasmania 20-21 April 2024

Two Sorrento crews headed south to compete in the 2024 2K Teams Nationals sailed out of the Royal Yacht Club of Tasmania (RYCT). Tassie turned it on across the weekend with temperatures in the low 20s which was surprisingly better than Melbourne. The two teams consisted of SSCBC Next Gen sailors who have progressed through various sailing pathways at Sorrento.

Sorrento 1 - Jack Abbott & Tom Trotman (Helms), Sunday Gibson, Tom Klemens, Jack Lloyd, Grace Cockman, Michael Fels and Steph Gray.

Sorrento 2 - James McLennan & Jack Felsenthal (Helms), Jack Lewis, Alex Dare, Elle Sankey, Lox Vaughan and Allie McLennan.

2K racing is an exciting format where there are only two boats on the team (four on the course), with the winning combination requiring both boats on the team to help each other not be last across the finishing line.

Sorrento has a long history of supporting 2K events and it was great to see the teams fight it out to remain at the top of the field in this combative style of sailing. The format requires 50% gender balance and is one of the fastest growing Team Sailing events in the World.

This provides an amazing platform for sailors who have raced against each other over the years in Couta Boats, school teams racing and junior and youth classes, to now having the opportunity to sail together and use their team racing knowledge in this area.

The Championship was conducted on Elliott 6s with two local teams from RYCT and Derwent Sailing Squadron, as well as competitors from the ACT and also our neighbours from Blairgowrie.

Day one was sailed in 5-12 knots and at the end of it, the Victorians were leading the field with Blairgowrie Yacht Squadron (BYS) ahead with five wins and both Sorrento teams locked together with four wins. A social BBQ at the club was a great end to a long day of racing in a well-run and friendly regatta. A few beers at Salamanca Place topped off the day in sensational Hobart fashion.

The second day was a closely fought battle in light conditions, culminating in the final race of the day which saw Blairgowrie take on Sorrento 2. A win for BYS would secure them the Championship. Sorrento led from the start to deny BYS the win, leaving a

bizarre result of a four-way tie for first, even after each team sailed 10 races across the weekend, highlighting just how close the racing was. The end result was four teams were all locked on equal points with seven wins each at the end of the two round robin series. With no time for further racing, the committee calculated the total positional points of the top four boats against each other.

Results

- 1st. Sorrento 1 (defending their 2022 title)
- 2nd. Derwent Sailing Squadron
- 3rd. Sorrento 2
- 4th. Blairgowrie

Thanks again to the Club for supporting us and making it all possible. We all appreciate the opportunity the Club has given us and the ability to represent SSCBC on a National stage.

After all the hard work throughout the winter our sailors hit the road travelling to Adelaide for the most recent 2024 Optimist Nationals at Brighton and Seaclyff Yacht Club in early January. In what was expected to be a seabreeze filled event with strong winds, we were met with light winds and excruciating heat. This did not deter the Victorian Teams Racing Team comprised of Sorrento Members, Augustas, Callum, Leigh and Lottie who took out the Australian Optimist Teams Racing Championships for a third time in a row and the second time by an all Sorrento Team.

After this the regatta played out with really tricky days that could not be further away from what was forecast, however this seemed to help some of our younger sailors with Fred Cantwell coming out of the blocks with a really strong start and Tom Bonnett in his first ever nationals continuing to improve as the regatta went on. All our sailors continued to show amazing resilience in the heat.

On the final day of the qualifying stage Tate Cantwell achieved his goal of making gold fleet with some impressive races in fickle light and wavy conditions being one of the most improved sailors since last year's nationals. With his close friend Acklin Stent ever so closely missing the podium in one of the races, continuing to show amazing growth throughout the year. As the races went on the battle at the top was becoming clearer, with Augustus Buividas vying for the top prize and Ashlea Tan being very close to qualifying to go to the European Championships with Coach David White in Italy later in the year. But

the most nail-biting finish was Lottie Griffith who with all the drama of a protest in the last race managed to match the amazing accomplishment of her best friend Jorja Mahoney and qualify for the Worlds Team as well as retain the 1st placed female perpetual trophy, the third time in a row from a sailor from Sorrento.

After a fun summer of sailing which culminated in the Optimist State Championships at SYC on the March long weekend. We saw 3 great days of racing in 39 degrees of heat which presented an amazing opportunity for some of our youngest sailors to experience their first regatta outside of Sorrento. It was amazing to see some of the young sailors achieve such amazing results in the green fleet with Atticus, Oscar and Charlie all placing on the podium. Their smiles and enthusiasm despite the fact that they were held on shore due to the strong winds

was palpable, with young 7-year-old Charlie McLaren joking that he should move up to Open Fleet so he could get out on the water.

The racing in the intermediate fleet was unbelievably close with Charlie Kelley, Tyler Deeth and Fred Cantwell continuously making massive improvements as the regatta went on. Lessons were learnt from every mistake; the boats were pushed harder, and the tactics of winning races were discussed showing how far this young group has come. Fred showed that if he got off the line in space that he had the speed and work rate to fly upwind and Tyler was the king of the pin end consistently port tacking the fleet. In the end in his second regatta outside Sorrento after an amazing display Charlie Kelley came second by a point to a sailor from NSW, making him the first Victorian Intermediate followed closely by his Sorrento counterparts.

In the Open Fleet supported by Peter McCann, Augustas showed off his near perfection of the boat with a picket fence and second State Championship in a row. Followed closely by Lottie Griffith who capped off her final regatta in style winning First Girl. Acklin Stent was equally as impressive as his refinement of the boat is beginning to show with his consistency improving. Ashlea also showed this amazing consistency in spades as Leigh Harvie and Maya Cantwell loved the breeze when it came through in what would be their last regatta. Tate and Frances kept pushing being in contention many times around the first windward. With Lily proving that there's no substitute for starting at the favoured end and Tom Bonnett put together some great results as he steps up into Open Fleet just a few months after coming out of Green Fleet.

We're incredibly privileged at Sorrento to have some of the best Optimist Coaches in the world at our disposal with David White and Peter McCann who have come from Ireland. Both amazing coaches in their own right. Irish Dave with years of experience at an international level with not only the Irish but also Australian Optimists National Teams and Irish Pete having placed in the top 5 at two Optimist Euros as well as having years of knowledge at an international level to be able to pass onto the sailors.

It truly is a privilege to work with the Opti Sailors and to see the amazing potential that they all have not just as sailors but as people. They are some of the best competitors who never make excuses, always do their turns, and push the limits wherever they can. Whilst it's sad as they move on to bigger and better things, we're fortunate enough to always



have amazing young sailors just starting their journey to help fill the gaps. With the past sailors returning and mentoring those young sailors coming up. This culture is unrivalled and helps to bridge the gap in what can be seen as the most technically daunting class for any adult. Which makes it amazing to see these sailors take the challenge in their stride and see these friendships continue long into other classes.

It would be remiss to not also thank the parents for their amazing support, the hours on the road travelling, anxiously watching from the sidelines and trips to the chandlery to purchase another lost watch or pair of sunglasses. They're truly the best, never afraid to lend a hand in whatever is asked of them whether that be on a committee, manning the start boat in the rain, holding down the barbecue or canteen or picking up a spare part from the middle of nowhere and all whilst bringing down one of the best sandwiches or slices you've ever had in your life to the boat park. The support doesn't go unnoticed and whilst the kids don't thank you now, I promise in a few years they will. I cannot be more fortunate for the support I've got from my family in my time in the Optimist and Laser and I extend that onto the amazing group of parents we have that make everything happen! Sailing is truly the oldest and greatest obsessions in sport and it's a pleasure to be a part of some of these amazing sailors' journeys.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT PROGRAM

Our connection with our community both at the southern end of the peninsula and further afield has only strengthened now that the Clubhouse redevelopment is complete. It's been very satisfying to see the Club being fully utilised in every capacity for what it was intended; focus groups and sailing academies holding conferences in The Fort while briefings, regatta registrations, results and jury meetings are taking place downstairs in the Lacco Room, lawn areas and Coloured Wall. Lavendar Hill and the lawn areas continue to provide a beautiful location for BBQs, welcome briefings and flag raising, while sail training is happening in the Sailing Centre – sometimes all at once!

Below are just a few of the community groups we have welcomed to the Club over the past 12 months.

Sorrento Writers' Festival

Members will be aware of the success of the Sorrento Writers Festival, now approaching its third year. The Festival attracted 190 speakers, over 160 volunteers (mostly local; some SSCBC Members) with 15,743 tickets sold; what an incredible swell of support for literacy, discussion and debate which undoubtedly achieved their mission of bringing writers and readers together and to create meaningful and mutually-respectful conversations. The Club was thrilled to offer The Fort as one of the Festival's 12 local venues, where we hosted a variety of speakers and musicians throughout

Melbourne Indigenous Transition School (MITS)

We provide an opportunity for over 50 students plus staff from MITS to visit the Club each year, enjoy a boat ride and a fun filled day on the water, visiting the seals and experiencing the best the Club and Bay has to offer. MITS is a transition school and boarding program for Indigenous students. Based on Wurundjeri Country in Richmond, their students come from remote and regional communities across the Top End of the NT and Victoria. Through MITS, students go on to lead lives full of choice and opportunity.

The MITS students and leaders arrived on a Sunday in February and enjoyed some time on Lavendar Hill before an informal welcome from the Club, and in return a MITS student performed an acknowledgement of the land and raising of the Indigenous flag, before boarding the volunteer boats. Once they returned to land, our volunteers cooked a BBQ lunch on the hill while the students enjoyed

some recreation time on the beach.

It was such a wonderful day! It was just perfect on the water, and all of the volunteers were so generous with their time, their knowledge and their warm welcome to the students. I was lucky to join with my family and it was truly our favourite morning of the year! Edward Tudor, CEO MITS

Rosebud Secondary College

This year we continued our support of Rosebud Secondary College's Marine Rescue Course in Powerboat Handling and Marine Safety, with the support of SSCBC staff, resources, Club Members and facility usage. Throughout the



school term, we offered 11 x 2 hr sessions to a class of 24 students, focusing on marine safety, power boat handling, general boating skills and weather readings – also an introduction to life at SSCBC for potential part time roles / future employment as Bosuns. As part of the course, the students receive a Power Boat Handling Certificate.

Sorrento Primary School & St Joseph's Primary School

For many years, SSCBC has worked with Sorrento Primary School and St Joseph's Primary School, to provide a beach day experience for the Grade 5 and 6 students.

The children experience both on and off water activities and have the opportunity to participate in a sailing lesson and enjoy a boat trip to visit the seals and dolphins.

We also support the local schools with their fundraising activities.

The Portsea Camp

One of our oldest and most highly respected neighbours, The Portsea Camp, lives by their mission of providing a safe, caring, healthy, educational and recreational environment for the children of Victoria and NSW, with a major focus on those who are disadvantaged and have special needs. SSCBC supports the camp wherever possible, and has recently provided our bus and driver for various community events run by the camp.

We participated in The Portsea Camp's Happy Vibes program for girls in September, where over 50 girls aged 8-17 from disadvantaged backgrounds enjoyed a sailing experience at the Club.

We also hosted the camp's Happy Vibes luncheon in the SSCBC dining room this year as part of their major fundraising campaign. We are undertaking regular discussions

about ways to support their camps and introduce those less fortunate to the joys of sailing.

Victorian Institute of Sport (VIS) / Australian Sailing (AS) High Performance Academy

Throughout the year, the Club enjoys a close relationship with the VIS and AS with mutual benefits from sharing resources, knowledge and our facility as their peninsula base. Thanks to VIS and the team at AS for their passion and commitment to the development of the sport. We love having them here. We are looking forward to hosting the VIS Mr Trampoline Buxton VIS Cup this season where our junior and youth sailors will benefit enormously by sailing alongside some talented VIS sailors in a fun, teams racing format.

Mornington Peninsula Foundation (MPF)

The Club continues to support MPF in the amazing work they do in the education space on the Peninsula, undertaking vital work in implementing systemic change to improve literacy rates in schools in various pockets across the region. Despite the wealth and privilege often associated with

the Mornington Peninsula, MPF has opened our eyes to an often hidden problem of child illiteracy at pre schools, primary and even secondary schools. Their programs are world first, making life changing differences to children to break the cycle of illiteracy.

The Club raised almost \$20,000 at our annual Ladies Long Lunch with a silent and live auction of goods and services generously donated by our amazing community, both here in Sorrento and in Melbourne. From tickets to the Grand Prix, to local Yoga vouchers and hampers, the 200 ladies who attended the event certainly dug deep to support this amazing cause.

Our donation has been used on MPF's preschool program that concentrates on improving oral language development in children by upskilling teaching and support staff. MPF are supporting this work in six preschools in low socio economic areas on the Peninsula where levels of oral language are very low. Addressing this gives children a great start when they get to school with respect to learning to read, and upskilling teachers builds long term sustainability.

A huge thank you to the organising committee who made the event happen: Alex Harvey, Ani Haddad, Georgie Silverwood and Georgina Harvey.

MPF was also the charity partner for the KPMG Couta Boat Classic, receiving a valuable donation from KPMG and raising awareness of the foundation to the KPMG staff and guests on the day.

Why SSCBC?

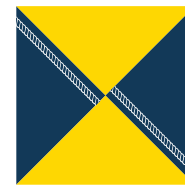

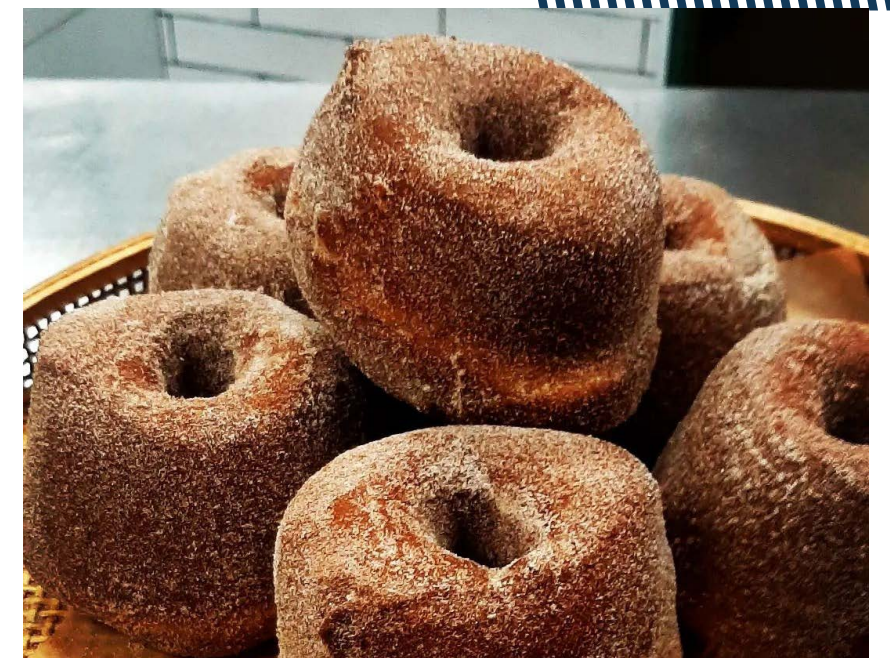
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MATT'S DOUGHNUTS

Makes 10-12

Ingredients

- 4 eggs (700's)
 - 515g Baker's flour
 - 2g dried yeast (1 tsp)
 - 10g table salt
 - 50g caster sugar
 - 112g water
 - 65g milk
 - 437g butter
 - Zest of 1/2 lemon
 - 1tsp vanilla extract
 - Canola oil for frying
-
- 250g caster sugar
 - 50g powdered cinnamon



Method

1. Sift flour and add, sugar & yeast
2. Melt butter and mix together with water and milk (combined mixture 34°C)
3. In a large bowl or mixer combine wet & dry ingredients, beaten eggs, salt, lemon zest and vanilla (don't worry if the mix looks slightly split, this adds layers to final product)
4. Leave to proof to double in size for about 5-6 hours at 18°C to 24°C
5. After 1st rest has been achieved, with your hands knock back by lifting the dough from the edge of the bowl to the centre rotating a quarter turn 4 times as if you are folding into a square (this should bring back to a smooth dough)
6. Rest overnight (12-18hours)
7. In the morning repeat the folding process (5) and refrigerate for at least 3 hours
8. Turn out cold dough onto a lightly floured bench. Roll into large rectangle and give the dough 3x book leaf folds as if you were making puff pastry (be careful not to use too much flour as they will separate during frying)
9. Let the dough rest on bench so the gluten structure relaxes for the final roll
10. Roll to approx. 1inch thick
11. Using round pastry cutters, stamp to desired size as well as stamping out the centres using the smallest cutter (you can keep the centres to fry as bomboloni)
12. Refrigerate for at least 3 hours. These can now be stored in the fridge for up to 3 days before using
13. Pull out of the fridge to bring to room temperature for an hour before frying
14. Heat oil to 170°C fry on each side for 4 minutes
15. Once cooked toss them in cinnamon sugar while hot

I'm looking forward to training new staff for the busy summer season ahead.

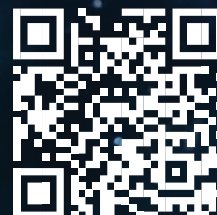
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SPONSORSHIP REPORT
